Portarlington Ferry 30 January

We had 7 members make an early start, catching the 6:55am train to Southern Cross, then a 500m walk, crossing the bridge to Docklands, where we boarded the 'Geelong Flyer' ferry and travelled to Portarlington. The ferry section of our journey provided a completely different view of many of Melbourne's landmarks, including the main dock area where all manner of ships were being loaded/unloaded, sailing under the Bolte and Westgate bridges to mention just a few. Our return journey departed at 4pm. Even though the afternoon breeze had built, with many white horses and choppy conditions, the ride was still incredibly smooth. A wonderful day was enjoyed by everyone. To those that thought the 6:55am train was too early, we all think you missed out on a fantastic day trip. Maybe next time??

Titanic Exhibition, Melbourne Museum, Tuesday, 26 March

One of the most famous tragedies in modern history, the story of the Titanic and its ill-fated maiden voyage continues to enthral, educate and break hearts more than 110 years since she sank to the bottom of the ocean.

Collect your boarding pass and embark on a journey to explore the powerful stories of those who travelled and worked onboard the legendary ship.

This is the only exhibition in Australia to feature more than 200 real artefacts, recovered directly from the wreck site. 'Titanic: The Artefact Exhibition' focuses on the voyage's compelling human stories, taking visitors on a memorable journey through the events of that fateful night.

We'll arrive at Southern Cross at 9:05 am, **(7:39am departure Wendouree).** Trams #86 & #96 depart Spencer/Bourke Streets every 7 minutes, with both dropping off at Melbourne Museum front entrance.

10:00am booking for the Titanic display, allowing 1.5 – 2 hours for casual viewing.

Lunch options in Lygon Street include Egyptian, Persian, Italian, Pakistani, Turkish, Mexican etc, all within a couple of blocks of the museum. Return to the museum for a further look around, then tram back to Southern Cross.

Train departs 4:39pm, arriving Wendouree 6:05pm.

Seppelt Underground Tour, Tuesday, 23 April

The Great Western winery was founded in 1865 by Joseph Best, with the excavation of The Drives commencing in 1868. Joseph Best discovered the ground on the site was made of a rock bed of decomposed granite, an easily dug, yet solid compound. He commissioned local gold miners to tunnel underground cellars to store his wines. These cellars are known to this day as 'The Drives'. Initially consisting of only a 9-metre-deep shaft entry and a single Drive, successive owners of the winery continued to extend the hand dug Drives over a period of 60 years to cellar the extensive collection of famous wines produced at the property and store them at an optimal temperature of 16 degrees. The Drives are a maze of tunnels which stretch under the vast property for an incredible 3kms, being the largest underground cellaring system in Australia and have the capacity to store 3 million bottles of wine! Underground tours have a duration of approx. 1hr 15 mins, and involve a total of 25 stairs, with 1 flight of 4, 1 flight of 9, and a further flight of 10.

Cost is **\$20** concession, with a small wine tasting included. Lunch will be at the café at the completion of the tour. There are numerous wineries well worth a visit after lunch, prior to our trip home. Come along and make a day of it.
